

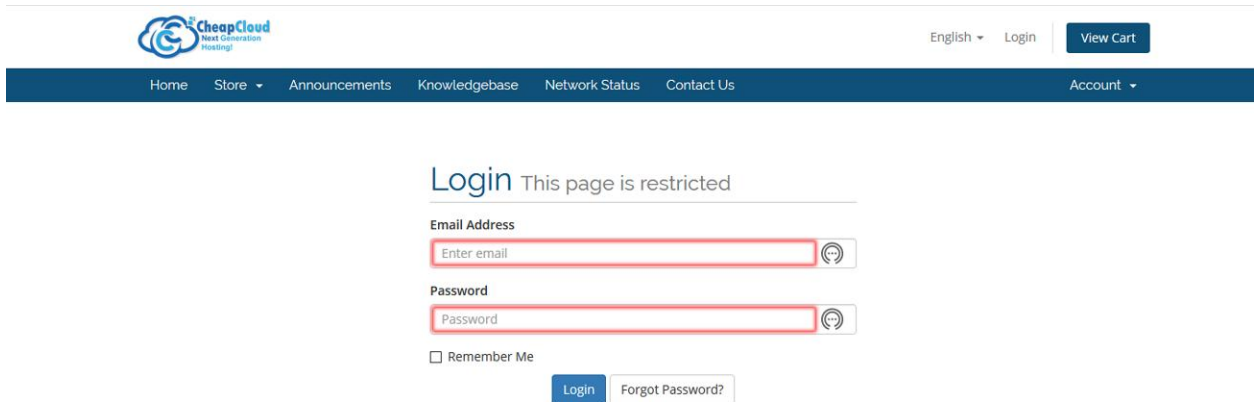
## How To Install WordPress on CheapCloud

CheapCloud highly recommend the installation of WordPress at their web hosting packages. Installing WordPress is extremely easy as the installation process is very user friendly. Please follow the following steps to install WordPress at your hosting package.

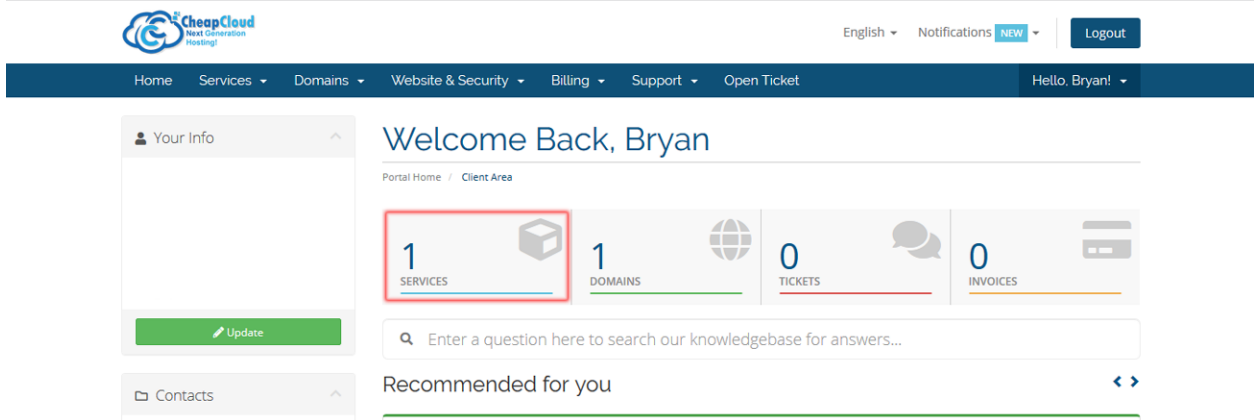
1. Simply click the “**Login**” button from CheapCloud main page.



2. Login using your email address and password to access the client area.

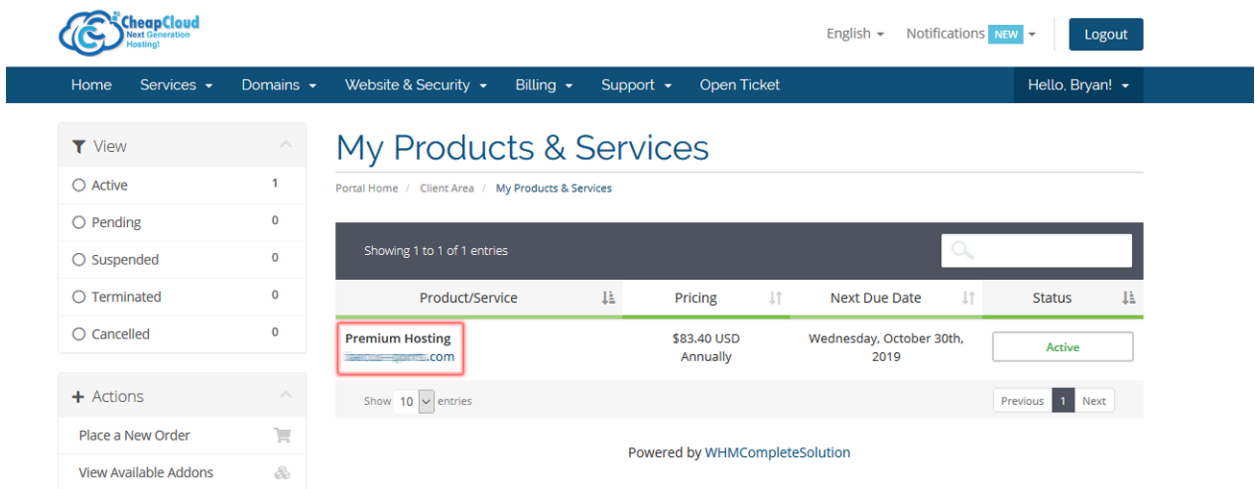


3. Select “**Services**” to bring up “**My Product & Services**” page.

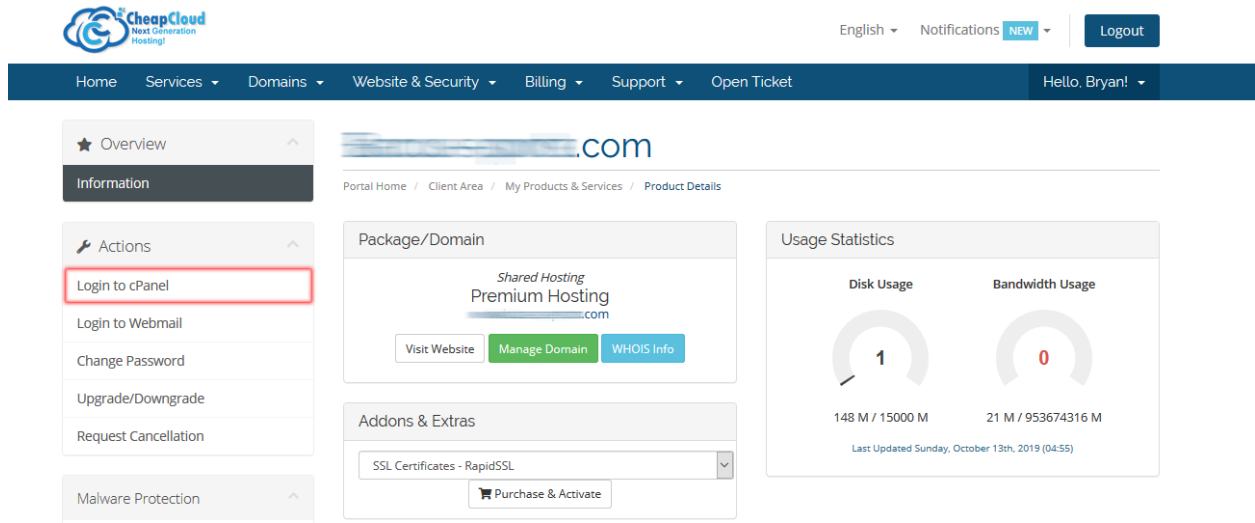
4. Select your hosting package name as shown below.

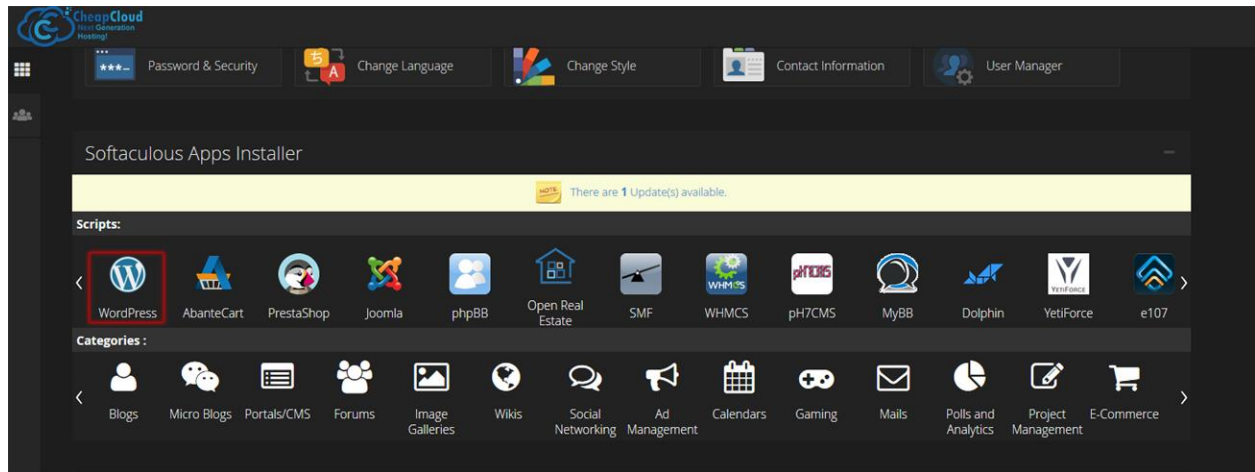

5. Select **“Login to cPanel”**. This will launch the cPanel feature



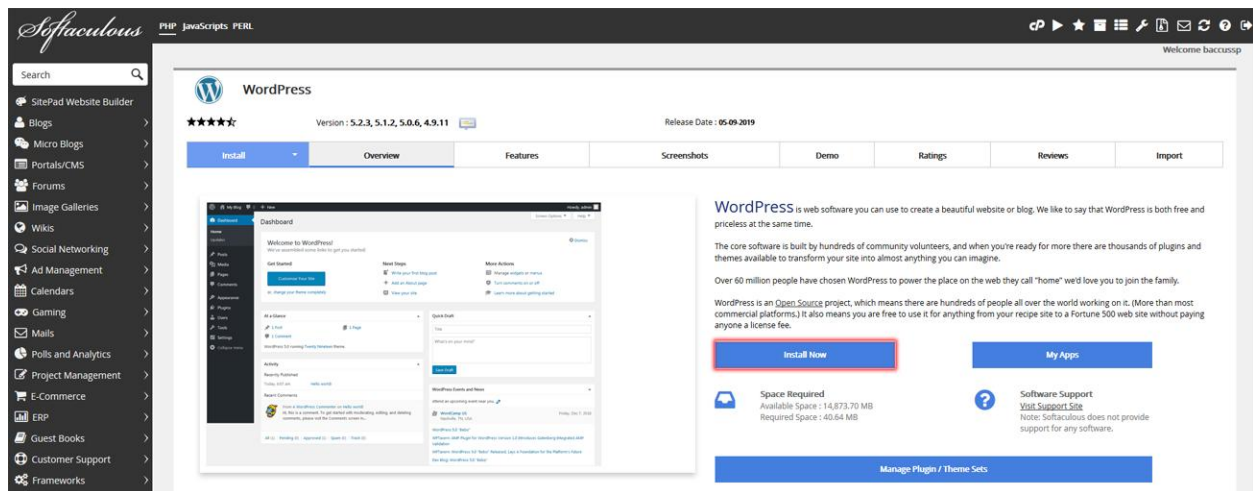

6. Scroll down until you reach **“Softaculous Apps Installer”** section. Select **“WordPress”** to launch the installation.

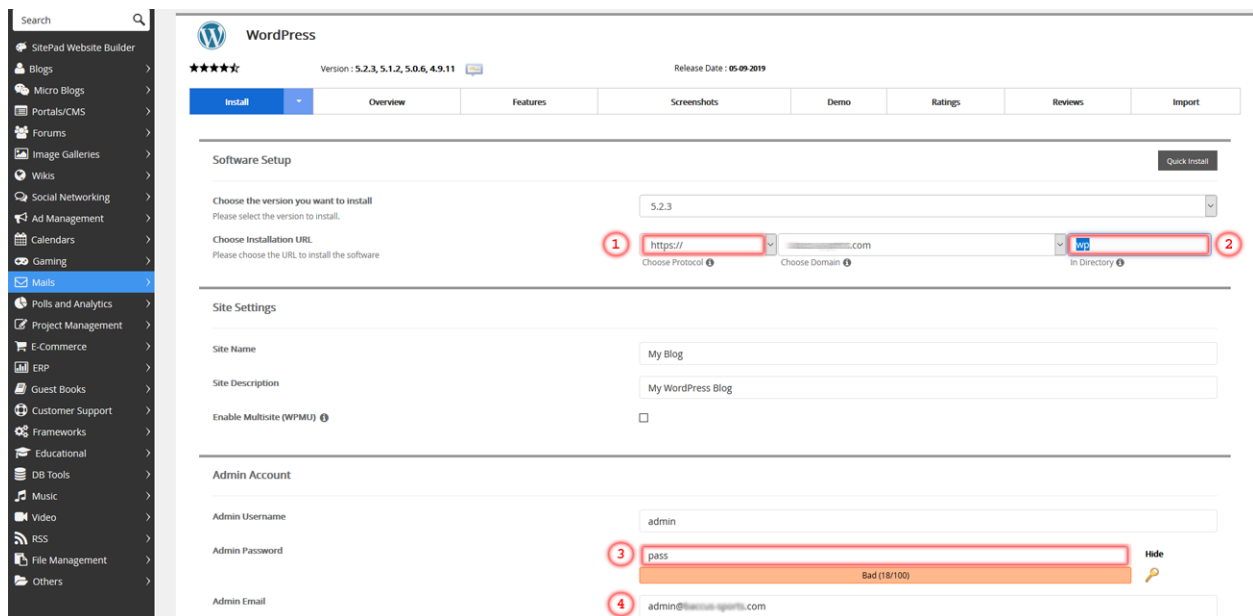

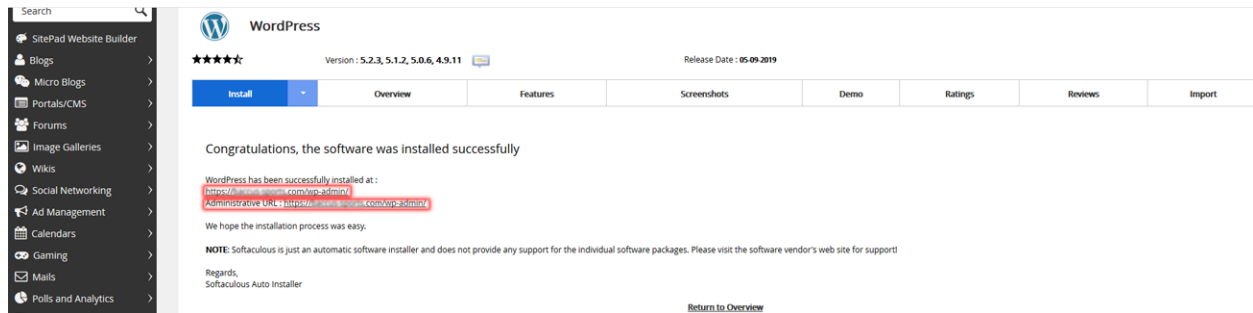
7. Select “Install Now” to execute the installation process.



8. Make sure the protocol is set to “https” and delete “wp” as we will not be installing WordPress in a directory. Make sure to change your “Admin Password” and set your “Admin Email”. Click “Install” button to proceed with the installation. The installer will now run in the background and setup WordPress.



9. Once the installation is completed, you will be provided with two links as shown below for administrative purpose of your WordPress page.



You can start accessing your WordPress using the username and password set at step 8 of this tutorial.
